



VECF and the Virginia Promise Partnership respectfully encourage support of the Senate budget position on VPI per pupil amount (PPA) funding.

Discussion: House budget amendment Item 145 #8h modifies the Governor’s introduced budget (HB1800) by reducing the proposed VPI Per Pupil Amounts in FY22. The amendment “saves \$11.1 million the second year from the general fund and increases the VPI per pupil amount by 10% from \$6,326 in fiscal year 2021 to \$6,959 in fiscal year 2022.” The introduced budget had proposed increasing the per pupil amount to \$7,655 for FY22.

This funding directly supports the quality and sustainability of VPI services for at-risk preschoolers. This is exceedingly important now as the impacts of the pandemic become clear as evidenced by widening achievement gaps and social-emotional struggles among young children.

A greater percentage of Virginia children (45%) started kindergarten without having the key literacy, math and social-emotional skills needed to be successful.

The drop in entering kindergarteners’ literacy skills represents the largest ever single year decrease (5 times that of any one-year change in the history of PALS since 1997).

Virginia’s most vulnerable kindergarteners fared the worst; there are disproportionate numbers of children at high risk for reading failure among Black, Hispanic, economically-disadvantaged students and English learners (ELs).

Kindergarten teachers reported greater concerns about children’s social-emotional well-being.

It is imperative that Virginia provide sustained access to high-quality environments and experiences that support children’s healthy growth and development. VPI’s per pupil amount has never adequately or fully supported the true cost of a quality preschool experience. Now is the time to do more, not less to support Virginia’s signature early childhood program.
